Sermon Text: Song Of Solomon 1:1

The Song Of Songs

1: The song of songs, which is Solomon's.

Music plays a big part in Holy Writ. For starters, we think of the words in Ephesians 5:18b-20—“but be filled with the Spirit; Speaking to yourselves ***in psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, singing and making melody in your heart to the Lord;*** Giving thanks always for all things unto God and the Father in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ.”

There are many examples of this truth in Scripture, many of which are found in the book of Psalms—which could perhaps be called “the song book of the Christian church.”

A few examples would be:

Psalm 18—“***David***, Psalm 18: intro & 1 “***To the chief Musician, a Psalm of David, the servant of the Lord, who spake unto the Lord the words of this song in the day the Lord delivered him from the hand of all his enemies, and from the hand of Saul: And he said, I will love thee, O Lord, my strength.***”

Psalm 45—“***Psalm 45: Intro & 1 To the chief Musician upon Shoshannim, for the sons of Korah, Maschil, A Song of loves.*** “My heart is inditing a good matter: I speak of the things which I have made touching the king: my tongue is the pen of a ready writer.”

And this morning by the grace of God we begin our study of **The song of songs, which is Solomon's.** Some believe that Solomon was the one whom the Holy Spirit used to write Psalm 45. This is very possible.

Psalm 45 will be very useful to us in our study of ***The Song of Solomon***, or ***The Song of Songs***. We will refer to it often in coming weeks, months, and years—God willing.
